Our Student Union supported the Spruce Grove Food Bank in style with our first ever Food Fight for the Food Bank. Please see more information on this later in the newsletter.



This year, SGCHS staff and students took part in our first ever Holiday Food Fight - an inter-grade level competition to see who could bring in the most donations for the Parkland Food Bank. Everyone was encouraged to bring in donations between December 6th and 17th, and the grade level with the highest, positive point total at the end of the two weeks would be declared the winner. It seemed simple enough at first glance. It's a food drive, afterall. That is, until we explained the point structure: any donated food item in a can or jar was worth positive points, and any boxed or bagged food item was worth negative points. Suddenly, folks had to consider their donations strategically because they could be used both for and against them. For example, if someone wanted to donate 10 cans of soup, then they'd likely add it to their own grade level bin, as it added positively to their point total. But, if they had 10 boxes of cereal, well then they had to make some choices. Do they split it between the 2 other grades, so that each loses points? Or add it all to 1 bin, so that that grade level takes an even harder hit? The stakes were suddenly so much higher, and each grade level was committed to defeating the others.

Over the course of 2 weeks, students and staff fought valiantly against each other, bringing in all sorts of valuable donations, working together to sabotage the other grades, and even taking full advantage of triple point days - both those that contributed positively to their scores (like cleaning and personal hygiene products) and those that saddled with opponents with negative points (like our 2 day peanut blitz). Some students took the risk of entering into our prize draw for items such as Ms. Otto's parking spot and school gear. The prizes alone were sweet treats, but the cherry on top was that the winners also won all of the money raised in entries as positive points added to their grade level totals, and the losers lost all.


With so many different opportunities to raise points, the question of who would be declared the winner of the food fight remained unknown throughout the competition. The 11s started out in the lead, but quickly dropped out of the running, remaining mostly in 3rd place. Our 10s overtook the top spot early, and despite many coordinated attacks by the other grades, they managed to stay there for the bulk of the competition. That is until the grade 12s took a narrow lead, with only 2 days remaining. On the last day, they looked poised to win it all, when out of nowhere, the grade 11s swooped back in with an impressive amount of last minute donations and absolutely blew the competition out of the water, becoming the inaugural winners of SGCHS Food Fight. As a result, the entire grade wins the bragging rights and a food-related prize when we return from winter break.


In the end though, the real winners of the SGCHS Food Fight were the Parkland Food Bank and the community they serve. Thanks to the efforts of our students and staff, we were able to raise \$700 and heaps of donations that will go a long way to supporting those in need. A big thank you goes out to all those who brought in donations and helped to support our efforts in this important endeavour. Our Panther pride is strong, but this event proved that our hearts and community spirit are even stronger.

Of course, we'd be remiss to not give an additional shoutout to our very own rockstar, resource officer, Constable Gord Marshall, who was eager to get in on our fundraising efforts. Ever the good sport, Gord graciously allowed students to pie him in the face for a \$ donation. And boy, did students take advantage! After at least 60 whip cream pies to the face, Gord maintained that he was happy to be involved and to help raise money for this important cause; he also made it very clear that he would not be having pie for holiday dessert this year.

# INDOOR GRADUATION COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY SATURDAY, JUNE 11, 2022 at 1:00 pm EDMONTON EXPO CENTRE

The Class of 2022 <u>Indoor Commencement Ceremony Only</u> will take place on <u>Saturday, June 11, 2022 at 1:00 pm</u> provided that current Covid Regulations are still in effect. The Edmonton Expo Centre is required to follow AHS and City of Edmonton guidelines. The current requirements for all guests 12 years of age and older are as follows:

- Proof of full vaccination (two doses) is required, with the second at least 14 days prior to the event, or
- Negative COVID-19 test that is Health Canada approved rapid antigen, rapid PCR or lab-based PCR tests completed within 72 hours, or
- Formal documentation of a medical exemption as defined on the Alberta government's <a href="COVID-19">COVID-19</a> public health actions | Alberta.ca site.
- Masks will continue to be required in compliance with Alberta Government guidelines.

### **Quarters vs Semesters Update**

At the beginning of the school year, Parkland School Division committed to reviewing quarters/semesters in our high schools by mid-year. After consultation with school administration, we have determined that we will not be shifting from quarters to semesters mid-year. This decision is based on a number of factors including the current uncertainty caused by COVID-19. Additionally, and more importantly, a shift from quarters to semesters would significantly, and negatively impact a number of students. A mid-year change would create an unfair situation resulting in some students being unable to have their schedules rearranged to meet their required courses. In a number of cases, this would jeopardize graduation.

The Division will re-evaluate in the near future and communicate the plan moving forward before the start of the 2022-2023 school year.




