- 3. An opportunity to roam the halls!

DLR - Directed Learning Room

- A school-wide intervention to support student success
- Tuesdays, Wednesdays & Thursdays from 3:15 5 p.m.
- Location: Library
- Students are assigned if they are:
 - Missing assignments or need to catch up
 - Making up or rewriting exams
- Assigned students **must** ATTEND
- Miss once phone call home
- Miss twice student is assigned an in-school suspension to complete the work

School Expectations of Students

It is vital that all students, parents, staff, and community members understand that our school has a culture that is different than the culture in your own homes, businesses, in the media, and on the street. Living up to the expectations of our school culture will promote the experience of a safe and caring school environment where all students can learn.

Expectation #1: Active Learning

Definition: To participate in learning by engaging in classroom activities, assignments and exams.

Expectation: Students take responsibility for their education by actively learning the curricula of their course load to the best of their ability.

Why?: By actively engaging in their learning, students are making the most of their education. Students are encouraged to access teacher support through class and seminar time. Students who fall behind, choose not to complete assignments, and/or plagiarize/cheat on assignments or tests are not engaging actively in their learning. High School is the perfect opportunity for students to discover their best way to learn; we encourage our students to make the most of their three years with us.

Expectation # 2: Appropriate Dress

Definition: Wearing clothing that is respectful of the learning environment.

Expectation: Students and staff will wear clothing that is non-revealing and does not have inappropriate slogans and/or references.

Why?: By dressing modestly (yet still stylishly), we are creating a positive learning environment. Undergarments should remain covered by clothing. Slogans must be appropriate and support a safe and caring school environment. References must be clearly positive in nature.

Expectation #3: Cell Phones/Smart Watches/Other Personal Electronic Devices

Definition: Any device capable of making a phone call, text messaging or accessing the internet.

Expectation: Personal mobile devices, including cell phones, may not be used, be visible or audible during class time. This includes use in the bathrooms and hallways during class time.

Why?: The classroom is a place for learning. Phone calls, text messaging and social media must be done outside of class time. Emergent issues can be called into the office. There is also a concern regarding cell phone cameras, therefore it becomes a privacy issue. Such items must remain out of examinations. Students sign a Tech Use Agreement with the School Division and they are expected to uphold this. Please Note: students who use any technology, personal or school-owned, inappropriately will be banned from use at school and, depending on the offence, may be referred to the RCMP.
Expectation #4: Attendance

Definition: Lates: coming after the usual, proper or expected time. Attendance: being in the classroom and actively learning.

Expectation: Students are expected to arrive in class before the bell rings and attend class on a daily basis.

Why?: We are trying to reinforce the learning environment for students by seeing students getting to class and being on time. Late students disrupt the learning environment. It is very difficult for students to be successful if they do not attend class or are consistently late.

School Attendance is critical to the academic success and overall well-being of you, our students!

6 or more absences in any one course, in an 80-day semester-based system, is a serious attendance issue. Students should expect:

- Teacher Intervention a conversation and phone call home
- Grade Coordinator Intervention a conversation, phone call or meeting to discuss alternate programming and plan accordingly
- Conversations that focus on resolving barriers to consistent attendance and successful completion of courses and earning of high school credits

SGCHS SUPPORT

STAGE 1

Teachers' identify attendance concerns that may begin to impact student success. Communication occurs with staff, student, family, and Grade Coordinator / Counsellor. Interventions may include student Seminar and DLR. Grade Coordinator issues "Attendance Letter 1" at 6+ absences

STAGE 2

Grade Coordinator requests meeting with family. Discussion of alternative educational programming and development of support plan. Grade Coordinator issues "Attendance Letter 2" at 11+ absences.

STAGE 3

Significant gaps in learning - ability to earn credit in question. Grade Coordinator consults with family on alternative programming with Connections for Learning or Academic Achievement Center. Grade Coordinator issues "Attendance Letter 3" at 16+ absences

CONNECTIONS FOR Learning

Student is removed from the course. Low attendance rates inhibit student learning success is best facilitated through distance learning program.



Student is removed from the course. Students possess strong independent reading and writing skills and will be successful recovering credits through AAC.

Expectation #5: Loitering

Definition: Spending time idly; lingering without purpose.

Expectation: Students are to be in class, not loitering in the hallways, bathrooms, cafeteria, lounge, parking lot, Aspen Glen Park or the back alley.

Why? Students who loiter in hallways disturb the learning environment in the classrooms. Students who loiter in bathrooms disturb the environment for those who seek to use the restroom for its intended purpose.

Expectation # 6: Respectful Communication

Definition: Appropriate communication between staff members, between students, between students and staff, and between students, staff and parents. Appropriate communication is the practice of non-heated conversations, positive body language, appropriate volume, tone and choice of language, as well as active listening. It treats those involved with dignity, honours their rights and recognizes the responsibilities they have to others without regard to race, religious beliefs, colour, gender identity, gender expression, physical disability, mental disability, age, ancestry, place of origin, marital status, source of income, family or sexual orientation. This also includes all electronic communications such as Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, TikTok, etc.

Expectation: Respectful communication is to be used at all times.

Why?: In showing respect, we build strong relationships within our school. We are educating our students not only to be technically prepared for life, but also to be good citizens. We wish to help our students develop so they will interact appropriately in future places of learning and in the work environment. By using respectful communication, we demonstrate our partnership in creating a positive learning environment.

Expectation # 7: Respectful Treatment of and Interactions with Others

Respectful Definition: Using dignity, respect, inclusion and fairness in the treatment of and the interactions with students, staff, and others.

Expectation: Students will respect the rights of others and will work toward creating an inclusive culture through their treatment of and interactions with others. They will refrain from, report and not tolerate bullying, degrading or exclusive behaviour directed toward others in the school, regardless of whether or not it occurs within the school building, during the school day or by electronic means such as Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, TikTok, etc.. Students will treat others with dignity, honour their rights and recognize the responsibilities they have to others without regard to race, religious beliefs, colour, gender identity, gender expression, physical disability, mental disability, age, ancestry, place of origin, marital status, source of income, family or sexual orientation.

Why? By treating and interacting with others respectfully, we create an inclusive school where everyone knows they have worth and value. This contributes to a learning environment that is well-ordered, peaceful, safe, non-threatening and conducive to learning.

Expectation # 8: Self-Advocacy and Self-Efficacy

Definition: Self-advocacy is the ability to speak-up for oneself and the things one believes are important—being able to ask for what is needed and/or wanted, and being able to share one's thoughts and feelings. *Self-efficacy* refers to one's belief in one's capacity to be successful in one's endeavours.

Expectation: Students will grow in their self-advocacy and self-efficacy over their time in high school.

Why?: The transition from adolescent to adult means learning to see oneself as able to achieve success because one has the ability to advocate for what is needed to be so. High School is the perfect opportunity for students to flex their independence. In high school, students have the opportunity to grow in their decision-making and confidence. By moving from dependency to independency with the support of their Grade Coordinator, Grade Level Counselor, teachers and parents, students set themselves up for success with a high school diploma which serves them as they enter into the world of post-secondary education and/or work.

Substance Use

- No smoking on PSD property
- Vaporizers are banned from Parkland School Division property as per Board policy. Being on-property includes being in a vehicle in the parking lot.
- Marijuana is still an illegal substance for people under the age of 18.
- The City of Spruce Grove also has a bylaw banning marijuana in public areas.
- You cannot be at school if you are under the influence of recreational substances. You will be suspended, and it is very difficult to recover from a multiple-day suspension in high school.

Personal Safety

- Everyone should feel safe in school.
- Fighting will result in a suspension.
- Spectating at a fight or promoting a fight through coercion, recording or the distribution of fight footage will also result in suspension.
- If you have a safety concern, be proactive and access support from Ms. Porter, Mr. White or another adult in the building.
