
School Council Summary

Overview: Student Attendance

- Student attendance measures improved 4% in the target area (90%+ attendance).
- Student attendance measures in the "at risk" category (75-89% attendance) decreased 5%

Interpretation: Student Attendance

- It is widely accepted that student attendance is a fundamental and significant indicator of student success.
- As part of our continued work on "Systems and Structures" at SGCHS, we revisited, redesigned, and recommitted
 as a staff to our "Attendance Structures of Support", which outlines the steps and procedures regarding student
 attendance.
- Through early intervention and clear communication with students and families, we saw a significant number of students move from an "at risk" categorization to attending over 90% of their classes.

- Year over year, there were isolated areas of improvement within the Standard of Excellence, with one course per department (Math, Social, English, Science) seeing an improvement.



Overview: High School Completion Data


- Overall, SGCHS students are slightly above the Alberta averages for 3, 4, and 5 Year Completion Rates.




Overview: Education Quality








Diploma Exam Success - Overall

- Student success at the "Acceptable Standard" is something that as a school and staff, we are very proud of.
 Students are clearly supported within their Diploma Level courses and have a variety of support structures in place to support their achievement.
- Student success at the "Standard of Excellence" is a concern; worthy of further inquiry and investigation. This measure has been consistently lower than the Alberta Average for a number of years, and suggests that many factors need to be considered to address and improve this measure.
- The following pages contain course specific data for each Diploma level course. Notable patterns of concern have emerged, with generalized decreasing success rates at the Standard of Excellence.
 - Targeting these courses specifically is a top priority for the school moving forward, conducting a deep analysis and gap reports to identify more specific interventions to reduce the school to province discrepancies.
 - Furthermore, it may indicate a need to revisit widespread academic supports and structures to better support students pursuing that "Standard of Excellence".





- Diploma Examination Acceptable Standard - Diploma Examination Standard of Excellence

- Only 5.6% of students reached the Standard of Excellence in SS 30-2, representing a decline compared to the previous 3-year average, as well as being below the provincial result.
- Given the decline in results at both the Acceptable Standard and the Standard of Excellence, examining instruction and assessment practices at the 30-2 level is important.

- The number of SGCHS students in Science 30 who achieved the Acceptable Standard is on par with the achievement of the province overall.
- At the Standard of Excellence SGCHS students were significantly below the province in Science 30. However, the number of students at the Standard of Excellence in this area was a marked improvement over the three-year average, indicating a positive development.

Diploma Exam Success - First Nations, Metis and Inuit Students

• Self-identified First Nations, Metis and Inuit students have achieved great success on Diploma Exams at SGCHS, results that exceed the Provincial Average in both the acceptable standard and the standard of excellence. We are proud of the work of our students, many of whom also contribute meaningfully to our school through the Indigenous Cultural Education (ICE) Team.

High School Completion

- The low dropout rate at SGCHS is reflective of the flexible and adaptable programming options available to students at the school, whose needs can be met in a variety of ways. Students who have the ability to engage in programs more tailored to their needs allow them to find success in school programs that include, but are not limited to Building Futures, The Academic Achievement Center, Concurrent Registration with Connections for Learning, and the Registered Apprenticeship Program.
- The significantly higher Returning Rate speaks to the welcoming, caring and supportive learning environments where students who may have experienced challenges and left the educational system are comfortable returning and resuming their educational journey at SGCHS.

Student Learning Engagement

• Student learning engagement continues to improve across all respondents. Our bi-annual "Student Forum" saw a large number of students participate in a day-long forum, seeking student feedback into the operations and programming of the building - many items and conversations specifically targeting student engagement.

Education Quality

- All respondent groups reported improved satisfaction, a welcome data set to support the continued work and development of staff.
- While classrooms and the education system are continually becoming more complex, the data supports the excellent work occurring at SGCHS.

Welcoming Caring Respecting & Safe

- While all respondent groups perceptions maintained or improved over the past year, the relative overall response of 76 percent is concerning. It suggests that continued work in not only promoting and ensuring but celebrating and sharing the positive learning environments is a priority moving forward.
- The significant difference in responses between parents (61%), students (72%) and staff (94%) suggest a significant disconnect in the perceptions of, and their relative day-to-day experiences and perceptions of the school environment.

Access to Supports and Services

- All respondent groups indicated a continual increase in satisfaction with access to supports and services.
- The significant difference in responses between parents (71%), students (80%) and staff (96%) suggest a significant disconnect in how respondents perceive the school's ability to effectively support students' needs, potentially identifying a need for increased clarity and communication about the range of services available to students and families.

Parental Involvement

- The continued low measures regarding parental involvement from all respondent groups is a concern. While the data is slowly trending upwards, a more significant intervention may be needed to bridge the disconnect between families and the school.
- This area needs consideration and consultation with our parent community about how to better inform and involve parents in their child's education in a variety of contexts.

Professional Learning

• A continued increase in satisfaction suggests that Professional Development has been effective in effectively improving teaching practices and staff growth. Continuing to offer meaningful site-based professional development and the self-directed flexibility will continue to provide valuable learning for staff.

First Nations, Metis and Inuit - Student Initiatives and Success

Over the course of the 2023/2024 school year, there were a number of student initiatives to support First Nations, Metis an Inuit students. SGCHS's Indigenous Cultural Education (ICE) team is a group of staff and students, working to develop meaningful connections at school, develop a shared cultural understanding, and encourage each other to learn and develop a deeper appreciation for Indigenous perspectives and ways of knowing.

Some of the key student initiatives and successes over the year included:

Alberta Mentorship Partnership 2023 Summit

• "Giving Them Our Best" Conference, where students and staff attended workshops, heard from speakers about how natural supports can complement the current mentoring initiatives in our school.

Student Trip to Smoky Lake - Metis Crossing

• Students and staff spent the morning immersed in nature with a Metis Cultural Interpreter. On this walk of the North Saskatchewan River, students and staff were taught to identify some common native plants and how they were traditionally used by the Metis. In the afternoon, stories were shared of how the Metis people survived off the land, and how plants and animals helped to sustain this community. "Through the Eye" provided knowledge and stories of how hunters use their surroundings to assist in hunting, and look for signs of the many animals that call Metis Crossing home.

Student Trip to Banff

• Students travelled and visited the Buffalo Nations Museum, providing links between the past and present with demonstrations of how the Native Arts are alive and flourishing. Students also had the opportunity to participate in a variety of outdoor activities such as curling, snow hut building, and visit the hot springs.

Special Guests and Indigenous Facilitators

- Kim Wild, a local Metis artist, visited SGCHS to lead students in a beading exercise, where participants created key chains.
- Elder Phillip visited on numerous occasions, sharing his knowledge and provided students the opportunity to participate in a smudging ceremony at the school.
- University of Alberta Indigenous Recruiter facilitator visited to discuss programming and grants opportunities, encouraging students to continue their education.

As students finalize their High School experiences at SGCHS they have the opportunity to participate in two cultural events. During "An Evening of Teachings", cultural leaders and Elders share with students stories and knowledge regarding the significance of the Eagle Feather and Metis Sash. Students then have the opportunity to participate in an Indigenous Cultural Celebration, where students are presented their traditional gifts that they were taught about as a symbolic recognition of the completion of the high school programs.

Reflections and Goals for the Future

Spruce Grove Composite High School spent the 2023/2024 school year focused on continuing to develop and examine our school's *Systems and Structure* to promote and support student success and wellness. Central to our development was professional learning and experiences based around critical teaching partnerships, where staff took part in reciprocal observations of colleagues to target various aspects of the profession such as differentiated instruction, planning and assessment, and universal design for learning. These opportunities allowed staff to promote and model strategies that improve success and wellness for students. Students reporting an increase (6%) in welcoming, caring, respectful, and safe learning environments is something that the school is especially proud of. This data would indicate a growing level of trust and respect between students and school.

Having the opportunity to build a more robust School Council was central to receiving key feedback and involvement from our parent community - an area of continued opportunity in the future. Continuing to work with this group, and finding alternative means for parents and guardians to meaningfully engage with their children's education is critical. This will be targeted through various methods - such as a return to in-person Parent Teacher Conferences, regular planning meetings with our School Council Chair, and the integration of more parent friendly feedback mechanisms. With the recent announcement surrounding construction funding for a replacement SGCHS, we understand the timely significance of expanding and developing our community connections.

Students achievement and success is evident based on their performance on achievement tests - outperforming the Province at the Acceptable Standard consistently. A significant area of opportunity for the future surrounds student achievement at the Standard of Excellence - a data set that SGCHS has consistently lagged behind the province. Notably, student learning engagement continues to improve year over year. Continuing to engage students, both academically through quality teaching methods, and socially through feedback mechanisms such as our bi-annual Student Forum, will continue to address this important measure. This work will start with clearly identifying measurables in each department, specifically for those without Diploma Exams, to question and qualify how we promote and support this Standard of Excellence across the school.

As we look ahead to the 2024/2025 school year, we will use many of the data measures and commentary provided to inform instruction and focus to improve students achievement at the standard of excellence, build a school community that continues to provide safe and caring learning environments for students, while recognizing and including the valuable role that parents and guardians play in the education of their children.
